Introduction

NATHEALTH's Southern Region Healthcare Dialogue was organized at Hyderabad under the theme of "Healthcare Priorities of Telangana & the Way Forward". The event witnessed huge participation from the healthcare sector of the region. The session focussed on various priority areas in healthcare.

The event fits well with NATHEALTH's 3.0 agenda and its focus areas for the development of India's healthcare sector - infrastructure expansion, digital health, healthcare innovation, globalizing India's healthcare, and Aarogya Bharat (health system evolution). Achieving these objectives at a state level requires reaching out to the state stakeholders - the event was a step in this direction.

The Federation is centrally located in the healthcare system wheel, and is a perfect culmination of players from all walks of the healthcare sector, including providers/hospitals, labs/diagnostics, medical equipment manufacturers, investors, payors, digital health providers, not-for-profit education institutions and also supply chain players. It is the only national body that works exclusively for players within the healthcare ecosystem.

NATHEALTH believes in a collaborative approach, and thus shares symbiotic relationships with other industry associations as well. The Federation delivers outcomes through a unified voice in healthcare policies and works in the interest of players who facilitate on-ground delivery of services.

NATHEALTH's mission is to be a valued partner to the Government and the private players, for developing an improved healthcare system in India. It provides regular feedback to the Government (Union and States) and works continuously with the private players - bringing everyone on the same platform.

This partnership has become stronger while battling the Covid-19 pandemic. Various key policy decisions were formalized and implemented as a result of consultations and discussions between NATHEALTH, its stakeholders, and the Government.

Such a partnership between the industry, the industry bodies, and Governments has been helpful in developing policies, which has made a huge impact on the management of the pandemic across the country. Further, to cater to the requirements of certain policies at the state level, NATHEALTH works together with regional bodies in the four key regions of the country.

A vision for state-focussed healthcare development strategy

To take the said mission ahead, NATHEALTH has now launched a drive to work with various Indian states, their stakeholders, and their Governments for a collaborative healthcare development strategy.

Healthcare Priorities of Telangana state

Boosting the state's current healthcare strengths

Hyderabad has witnessed huge advancements in the healthcare and life sciences sector in the last few years, and private players have played a major role in this success. The city has an advanced pharma and biotechnology sector, with a special focus on the vaccine industry. Almost 40% of India's pharmaceutical products are manufactured in Hyderabad, and the city has the world's largest number of FDA-approved labs.

Need for Government push towards healthcare advancements

To give a bigger push to the pharmaceutical sector, the

Telangana Government has plans to set up a new pharma city. Once built, it will have the world's largest pharma cluster. In the past five years, the Telangana Government has also given high prominence to the medical device sector. It has created an enabling infrastructure and supportive policies for medical device manufacturing. The result is that some of India's and the world's leading companies now have plans to open their manufacturing units in Telangana.

Higher priority to infrastructure development

In the last few years, the Telangana Government has increased its attention on the development of

healthcare infrastructure. This event was a case in point, where several public and private players came together to further strategize the improvement of the healthcare infrastructure of the state. focus NATHEALTH's on infrastructure development gels right with the Telangana Government's momentous decision to set up multi-specialty hospitals.

Capacity & skill building through medical colleges, job creations

The Telangana Government has considered the crisis of medical students of Indian origin studying in Ukraine and Belarus, and has thus decided to set up medical colleges in every district of the state, to increase the vacancies for future doctors and medical practitioners. Such an initiative is a boost to healthcare capacity and skill

building in the state. Again, this is one of the key focus areas of NATHEALTH as well, and a mission that can be achieved with collaborative efforts from NATHEALTH and Telangana Government.

Strengthening diagnostics & primary care

The Telangana Government has launched an initiative called Tdiagnostic, under which. Government has set up various labs in every hospital of the state and every tertiary care center of the state. There are 67 kinds of tests that can be potentially carried out and will be free of cost. Similar attempts have been made to strengthen the PHCs, the subcenters, and to provide better training to the healthcare workforce at these centers.

In the past five years, the Telangana Government has given high prominence to the medical device sector - by creating enabling policies to support infrastructure and medical device manufacturing. As a result, some of India's and the world's leading companies are planning to open their manufacturing units in Telangana

with NATHEALTH's strength of diagnostic members and skilling partners, the Federation is well-placed to be a strategic partner for the state.

Elevating digital health

Along with the National Digital Health Mission (NDHM), Telangana has started a digital health pilot program in two districts of Sircilla and Mulugu. Under the program, a door-to-door survey that helps in collecting vital health data is undertaken on 60 health parameters. Based on the survey results, data analysis of a bigger community shall be undertaken. For example, a large number of tribal communities live in the Mulugu district, and data analysis will be conducted to understand if there is any particular disease pattern,

which tribals show that other communities do not. Based on this, a healthcare plan can be rolled out for the region.

Digital health is a key priority for NATHEALTH as well, and the Federation already has working relations on various digital health initiatives with the Union Government and digital health providers. This lays the foundation for a fruitful partnership to flourish between the state and NATHEALTH.

Incubators and accelerators building up the start-up community

NATHEALTH is an industry leader where start-ups are concerned. It started building up the start-up community a few years back, which places NATHEALTH in a leadership position and at the forefront of the initiative. Telangana Government too, encourages start-ups, and this mutual focus opens up new pathways for a way forward on this agenda - for NATHEALTH, the Telangana Government and other stakeholders to work collaboratively. Currently, there are 57 incubators.

accelerators and T hubs in the state. In these T hubs, there is a distinct focus on health tech, and the Government is helping startups by providing them access to Government hospital POC data, by mentoring, and through fund assistance. The state of Telangana has one of the most enabling environments for start-ups.

On the development of Medical Parks

In the entire ecosystem, which has been developed in the country, there are four medical device parks announced by the Government of India. There is an existing park in Telangana too. The entire PLI scheme is expanded to other areas as well. The idea behind the production link is to expand into export, while India has a lot of imports. To achieve this, one important component is to strengthen the CFCS in most of the medical device parks, which is easier to achieve. Everyone would benefit from the same. The medical parks should also house bio material accelerators, AGS testing labs, solid waste management labs, common warehouses, adequate logistics, emergency response systems, and facilitate ITI training. The bigger medical parks should be categorized as SEZs (special economic zones). This change will push the export agenda forward.



On MedTech Policy

NATHEALTH Secretariat elaborated on the MedTech Policy by the Government of India. It explained how NATHEALTH has gathered stakeholder suggestions on the Policy and how they are being discussed with relevant Government offices regularly. NATHEALTH has also submitted its collated recommendations on the draft Policy.

The medical parks are also a part of the overarching Policy.

Points to ponder on the MedTech Policy:

- What should be the minimum infrastructure required by an SME?
- How to articulate the benefits accruing from the expansion of the ecosystem?
- How to create a template for multiple states to follow?
- How to ensure a multiplier effect?
- How to validate the process for start-ups?

Comments & Suggestions



On difficulties of Cashless Facilities

As per the hospital representatives in the audience, many providers in Telangana are facing issues with the non-viability of tariff rates of cashless schemes in the state (like Aarogyasri, EHS, BDL, NMGC, etc.). It was suggested that NATHEALTH play a role in standardizing the rates under such schemes, while also enabling a regular upgrade (Say every 2 years).

More suggestions on cashless facilities:

- Universal Health Card for all cashless schemes (there are around 60-70 schemes).
- A single window system for entrepreneurs who want to start a hospital / Health City.
- Removal of inconsistency in insurance payouts to hospitals.

Roadblocks raised by audience in Cashless Facility payouts:

- A universal card might not be possible as health is a state subject and the schemes are a mix of national & state-specific schemes.
- Price capping is not taking place as different agencies have different payment systems with different rates. TPA regulators should be brought into the discussion to bring more uniformity.



On the Start-up Ecosystem

The audience was of the opinion that a far lesser number of start-ups are robust enough to be partners with industries. Start-ups generally have three possible outcomes: either failing, acquisition, or becoming a leader. In all the cases, start-ups will surely add value to the system.

- Start-ups with market access and mentors have lower risk of failure.
- NATHEALTH can create a start-up platform, which is robust and has large scale.
- NATHEALTH is working closely to create structures & manage leading start-ups.

Growth areas to work collaboratively NATHEALTH & the state of Telangana

The session mentioned the state of Telangana's improved metrics on IMR, MMR, and nutrition status of the children, although, there is always room for improvement. The event opened up dialogues for further developments, which are collated here.
